



Howe's That

With the news that broke last week about the possibility of Howe landing Hawaiian Falls, the immediate questions began to resonate. I'll address some of those here.

Q: With our water bill so high already, how could we possibly afford to let Hawaiian Falls use it?

A: Howe's water bill issue is due to an agreement years ago before the economic downturn. Howe, along with Anna, Van Alstyne and Melissa entered into an agreement to purchase an amount of water (used or not). Howe has not come close to purchasing the amount available, therefore, the waterpark wouldn't even dent the supply still available. Hawaiian Falls also recycles 95% of the water they use. The 5% is restroom use, evaporation and the water that goes home on bathing suits. The answer everyone wants to know is that, no, it would not increase you water bill.

Q: Why would the city allow this if Lake Texoma is already so low?

A: Howe does not use Lake Texoma as a water supply at all. Howe uses well water underground in Howe and has rights to Lake Lavon if needed. To this point, no water from Lavon has been needed. But the payments being made for the rights are crucial for immediate growth. The development such as the one on page five is an advantage to those paying water bills currently. The bill would lower when it's spread out.

City talking with Hawaiian Falls and Walmart



Tuesday night's city council meeting contained more information on growth in the city of Howe than any monthly meeting in 50 years.

On the agenda were directions from the council to be made to pursue, or not pursue with two large companies with an eye on Howe, Texas as their next

venture location. Hawaiian Falls, which is a faith-based company owned by Harvest Family Entertainment, builds water parks that are normally constructed by using public-private partnerships where the city would make a commitment of public land use which would then

be paid back to the city over time. "The city owns the property, so we'd also have to put up the bond to build the complex," said Howe Mayor Jeff Stanley. "Now, they pay for the bond payments once they start construction. They pay all the bond payments, they hire all of the people, all

that. We don't have to do anything other than get the bond."

The talks with Hawaiian Falls were first initiated by Councilwoman Debbie Lowery, who frequents the water parks with her grandchildren. It was the Christian-friendly atmosphere that lured her to consider Hawaiian Falls

Three pastors from Howe were also in attendance for the presentation. With Hawaiian Falls being a faith-based company, Howe wanted to convey to Hawaiian Falls that the community shares the same vision as their company.

Lowery said that she got the impression from the meeting that Hawaiian Falls was interested in Howe because of it's location in the middle of heavy populated areas such as Collin County, Sherman, Denison, Gainesville, Bonham and Durant. Her hopes is that a landowner of Howe property would donate 25 acres in hopes of that increasing the value of the remaining land owned by the landowner.

The council gave permission to seek further interest and move forward. Shephard will talk with bond counselors to find out what the approximate bond payment would be.

to the small North Texas town.

The second business looking at Howe is Walmart, who would like to pursue the ideas of putting their Neighborhood Market in the city. Walmart's ideal location would be very close the the Haning Street and US 75 area and visible from the highway.

Howe Economic Development Director, Monte Walker and City Administrator Joe Shephard are talking with each company and various local landowners that could serve as the locations for the two separate projects.

Shephard, Walker, Mayor Stanley, Lowery and other city officials visited Hawaiian Falls back in September for a tour of the facility.

A very impressive presentation was given by Hawaiian Falls to the city at their location in The Colony.

The waterpark would need approximately 20-25 acres in Howe and their ideal location would be visible from US 75.

"What I would like to see is for us to build one here in Howe." said Lowery. "It's going to happen. We don't have a waterpark in this area or anywhere close. I think if Howe passes on this opportunity, other towns around here will grab them up."

The park would bring approximately 200 jobs to Howe and would kickoff a domino effect of a multitude of businesses coming to the Howe area.

An acre of land on frontage property is estimated at \$73,000 in Howe meaning that the land purchase would be \$1.8 million.

As mentioned, Howe has also been in contact with Walmart about a location to fill the void of not having a grocery store in the city. Walmart started the Neighborhood Market option in 1998 to give shoppers an experience of less crowded aisles and easier parking in these smaller communities. Residents of Howe, without a grocery store since 2006 when McLain's Country Store burned down, would welcome the opportunity to have the 28,000 items for sale at the tip of their fingers.

"I strongly agree with the grocery store," *Continued on Page #9*

JV wins 38-22 over S&S

The Howe Bulldog JV team defeated the S&S Rams 38-22 on Thursday October 23 at Bulldog Stadium. The Rams started the scoring in the game by taking the opening kickoff to their own 35, then driving 65 yards down the field for a touchdown and after converting the two-point conversion the Rams were up 8-0. The Bulldogs responded after taking the Ram kickoff to their 35 with an 11 play 65 yard drive that ended when quarterback Chase Harvey pushed over the goal line from the one yard line. After Winston Mosse took the pitch out around the right end for the two-point conversion, the Dogs were tied with the Rams 8-8. The second quarter turned into a defensive battle with the Bulldogs scoring the only points on a 15-yard touchdown by Mosse following a 75-yard drive. Jaden Matthews scored the two point conversion and the Bulldogs were up 16-8 at the end of the first half.

The Bulldogs took the second half kickoff 46 yards to the Rams 39 yard line and three plays later were in the end zone after a 15-yard run by Matthews. The two-point conversion was stopped short of the goal line but the Bulldogs had increased their lead to 22-8 over the Rams. After taking the Bulldog kickoff to their 45 yard line, the Rams put together a 10 play drive

that ended with a 10-yard touchdown and after a successful two point conversion had shrunk the lead down to a six point Bulldog lead at 22-16. On the following kickoff the Dogs were able to once again get a great return that landed them on the Ram 47 yard line. After six plays, the Bulldogs had once again crossed the goal line after a Mosse 15-yard run and a successful two-point conversion by Matthews which increased the Dogs lead to 30-16. On the ensuing kickoff, kicker Ty Harvey squibbed a kick straight ahead and hustled down to recover the football at the Ram 47 yard line. Seven plays later after the 4th quarter had begun, the Dogs were scoring another touchdown after a three-yard run by Brent Masters. The two-point conversion was good after a run by Cooper Akins and the Bulldogs were up 38-16.

The Rams would score one more touchdown midway through the 4th quarter with an unsuccessful two-point conversion attempt to finish the scoring in the game with the Bulldogs on top 38-22.

The Bulldogs are now 6-2 and will face the Whitewright Tigers next Thursday October 30th with a 7:00 pm kickoff in the final home game of the 2014 season.

offensive performance a week ago with 599 yards of offense and 589 yards rushing, looked more like the ending statistics in an unhealthy shellacking of a parent by an eight-year old in a friendly game of Madden '15. Just as the eight-year old gamer, Howe showed no mercy and piled up another night of offensive fire power. The defense was also in top shape, however an unfortunate defensive penalty just before the half and a special teams miscue made the score seem much closer than the game truly was.

Howe never trailed in the game and took the first lead at the 6:39 mark in the first quarter after Anthony Hawthorne scored on a five-yard run that ended a 70-yard drive that took 3:40 off of the clock.

S&S, who had already punted in their first possession, turned the ball over on downs to Howe at their own 31 yard line. That set the 'Dogs on a 69-yard march that would end on a nine-yard Stratton Carroll touchdown to give Howe the 14-0 lead with 9:06 left in the second quarter.

Both teams would then trade punts until Dalton Felder made the first of his two interceptions on the night. That set the Bulldogs up for

a chance to score just before the half and take a 21-0 lead into the locker room. Felder scored on a nine-yard touchdown moments later and Howe did infact go up 21-0. However, that left 1:08 on the clock remaining before the half.

S&S quarterback Ty Lollar converted quick hitters to his receiver Ben Franklin, who picked up crucial fourth down conversions. But it was Levi Mrozinski who nearly picked off a Lollar pass that left 1.1 seconds on the clock. Had Mrozinski made the pick, he might have scored to make it 28-0 at the half. However, with one play left, Lollar found his tailback Wyatt Maher on a middle screen that he took to the five yard line as time expired. There was a defensive penalty and rules state that a game or a half cannot end on a defensive penalty, therefore, S&S got one shot at the two-yard line after the 'half the distance to the goal' penalty. That's when Maher took it over from the two and the PAT made the halftime score 21-7 with Howe leading.

Howe had to punt on their opening possession of the second half. It was then that Felder jumped the screen pass route and intercepted his second pass of the night. This one he

Development planned for Howe



A development with the temporary name of Wood Creek is planned for the southern part of Howe by Tomlin Investments.

Scott Norris, of Tomlin Investments told the city council that they have projects currently in 14 different communities. They are proposing a housing community on the 478 acre tract that sits on the south entrance to the city at the east side of Blythe Road and US 75.

Norris said that they would pay for the city's professional fees concerning the property.

"We want to build a project, primarily a master plan housing community with frontage on US 75 and we respect the opportunity to help your tax base with opportunities for non-residential commercial entities." Norris told the council.

Norris said that they are willing to change the name from Wood Creek to something that reflects the history of Howe.

Also mentioned was a substantial "Welcome to Howe" sign that would be at the corner of the entrance which is the gateway to Howe on that property.

"We want to get this thing started," said Norris. "I've got a bunch of letters of interest. People have said basically, if you've got lots to sell, we're pretty interested in buying them, but we want to see what they look like."

With the housing market that's coming out of Melissa and getting in to Anna, Norris said his research shows that there is a vast amount of dual commuting taking place. For instance, some living in Anna work in Sherman and some living in Van Alstyne are working in Collin County.

These homes will be estimated on the low side of \$180,000 to \$225,000.

"What we're proposing will have five or six phases to it," said Norris. "We truly want to establish ourselves and have a partnership with the community as we develop these properties. Now's the time. We think the market's here. We can help Howe start to see some progression."

Norris said the biggest challenge would be the sewer since it's on the south side of town and that creates basic gravity issues of flow. They are planning to install

George Cavender *Continued from last week*



Cavender joined and was baptized in the First Methodist Church in Van Alstyne in 1943. After marriage to wife Frankie and moving to the farm, they joined to First United Methodist Church in Howe in 1948, where they still are active to this day.

One can learn a lot about a town from the previous generation. Some of the things the author of this story learned from George Cavender is that it wasn't too very long ago that Howe had a blacksmith in town and it was located on S. Hughes Street just north of downtown (where Hooten's Garage now sits).

Some of us that are entering our 40's remember Mack's Cash located on the northeast corner of Haning St. and S. Hughes St., but Cavender had a close relationship to the man who owned it before Mack.

"Mr. Malone owned that grocery store," said Cavender. "Mr. Malone died in 1946 or 7. He had a heart attack. That's when Mack bought the store and took over."

Cavender talked about the Interurban passenger train that ran from Denison to Dallas.

"In Van Alstyne it ran down through the middle of downtown," Cavender said. "In Howe, it ran down the alley (by Don's Smokehouse)."

"We went to the old church downtown," Cavender said. "I guess one of the most pleasing things of my life has been to be able to be a part of that church. We knew we couldn't expand that old church that was nearly 100 years old. Being able to move where we are now and seeing that church and facilities there grow has been a big part of our lives."

Cavender mentioned that some of the most fun he's had was sharing time with friends. Carl and Pearlene Wilson along with Jack and Maurine Orr were mentioned numerous times throughout the visit, which was interesting to the author because Carl and Pearlene Wilson were his grandparents. The couples all met at church and would often drive to Ashburn's in Sherman for ice cream.

Upon talking about Sherman brought back memories of his childhood.

"All I needed was a quarter. Jimmy Knox had a hamburger stand on W. Houston. I could get a hamburger and milkshake for a dime," said Cavender. "I could go to the Roy Rogers show for ten cents and then get a double dip of ice cream for a

nickel. So a quarter was all I needed for a good day."

Cavender remembered that before Mr. Chisum was downtown, it was Charlie Davis and Mr. Neal that owned that grocery store which is the third door from the west on the north downtown section.

It was in this building that the first chicken dresser in Howe was brought by Cavender to Mr. Davis and Mr. Neal.

"Everybody used to raise a flock of chickens," Cavender said. "I brought them a few dress fryers and those were the first dress fryers in town. People would come to town and want their chicken or hens dressed and he'd sell it to them a live weight and then charge them \$.25 for the rest of it. There's no doubt about it. I brought the first dress fryers that they had in Howe."

Cavender also mentioned Mr. E. Powell had a tailor suit store downtown and would measure and make a custom hand-made suit. He also talked of Bill Mayo's grocery store downtown where Cavender sold Mayo a calf.

"It weighed about 500 pounds for \$25," said Cavender. "He'd run it through his butcher shop there."

a sewer treatment plant and construct a water tower to bring the necessary water amount to the south side of the city.

The proposal packet to the council included an amenities center which would be a gated facility strictly limited to residents in the development. In addition, they would also have ball fields, that would be of use from youth sports organizations within the city. In the past, they have arranged a lease for \$1 per year for the use of practice fields for the youth.

Tomlin Investments were on the front line of the growth in Frisco when they developed Lone Star Ranch. It was an assemblage of eight properties with a total acreage of approximately 4,300 acres. When the land was acquired it had no entitlements, no utilities and had poor access. Tomlin developed a land plan and received zoning from Frisco. The decision was then made to develop 900 lots and use the profits from lot sales to install major thoroughfares, sewer, water, utilities and an amenity center to service the entire 4,500 acres.

Because the land was sold in numerous tracts, it is easiest to describe the land located west of Highway 423. That section was acquired in two tracts that totaled 1,616 acres. Tract "A" consisted of 1,496 acres acquired in 1997 for \$15,341,627, or \$10,255 per acre. Tract "B" consisted of 120 acres and was acquired in 2001 for \$3,347,613, or \$27,897 per acre. This brought the total purchase price to \$18,689,240 for the entire 1,616 acre section.

This information based off the Tomlin website says that the 1,616 acres sold in 2004 for \$80,000,000. The basis at that time was \$23,000,000.

Rooftops are essential for a growing community. Businesses that look at expansion areas want to know first-hand how many people their business can reach. It could start looking very different around the south part of Howe in the near future. What that would mean for Howe could be ever so different than at any point in the city's history.


especially if it's a Wal Mart Neighborhood Market, in which I work at now in Frisco." said Monica Eisworth. "If we were to get one, that would cut my hour drive time to work and an hour home way down. It would make it easier on this single mother and I'm sure for others as well."

The newly hired Economic Development Director, Monte Walker has had a pretty busy first two weeks on the job.

"I now understand why there was such a need for the position." Walker said. "The city has so many irons in the fire with opportunities for development and future commerce, that it's exciting to see the interest in our community from several different viewpoints."

Also mentioned in the city council meeting was an un-named fast food restaurant company that is looking at the same Haning Street and US 75 intersection. The city will be in talks with the company on a possible location to buy or lease.

All of the growth speculations have a few concerned whether the city can handle it all at one time. Concerns about the water capabilities and infrastructure has a few citizens asking questions. As far as the water issue goes, the city is not using close to the amount in reserve on a monthly basis and are actually paying for what they are not using under the agreement signed a few years back. That, coupled with Hawaiian Falls' ability to recycle 95% of their water, actually puts Howe in a greater position to accommodate a water park than surrounding cities. The movie, *Field of Dreams* famous line was, "If you build it, they will come." That, they will. That, they will.

Durning House bed and breakfast turns 25

Before 1983, a little old lady rented the house that sits on 245 W. Van Alstyne Parkway from Mr. Durning. When she was to the point of having to go to a nursing facility, her family held an estate sale at the location. Brenda Hix and Sherry Heath were two that came to the estate sale and fell in love with the house and eventually purchased the old home and converted it to an antique shop. It stayed that way for nine years due to the love of antiques by Heath and Hix.

In 1989, they remodeled the house and opened it as a bed and breakfast.

"We started it as a little tea room," said Heath. "We had just five tables to start with and when we began to get overrun with

people, we decided to get a little bit bigger and added on and built the big kitchen in the back."

The city fathers at the time thought that the idea of a bed and breakfast was laughable. The mockingly questions of 'who wants to come to a bed and breakfast in Van Alstyne?' made their ways back to the owners, but Heath and Hix held steadfast in their efforts to fulfill their vision.

"People told us that we should just rent the house out," said Heath. "But I just knew it was a good opportunity. There was nothing like that here. Everything was so stressful in Dallas that if you could just get away for a night or a weekend and not have to go very far, you might really enjoy time off."

It then became a very popular place for family visits. If the visiting grandparents didn't have room to stay in the house, they would stay at The Durning House. It costs anywhere from \$85 to \$135 per night to relax at the bed and breakfast.

The lunch restaurant opened in 1990 and Heath, who is known for her hearty and elegant lunch presentations admits that she wasn't always a cook.

"I didn't know a thing about cooking when I started," said Heath. "I'm kind of a risk taker. You can learn anything. I had a couple of friends who were really good cooks and they helped me get started, teaching the basics of cooking. The only thing I knew how to cook was what my mother cooked."

Heath began to collect cookbooks from everywhere she could find. And now, with time, she's become known for her Strawberry and Spinach Salad with a homemade dressing. That was the first thing The Durning House came up with and it's still a staple. In the winter, she would add a hot casserole and soup. Those things became the sampler plate. In the summer, it would be hot casserole, spinach salad and a cold salad.


The Jalapeno Cheese Soup is the hot item, no pun intended, that most people say are their favorite. The Chicken Ritz Casserole is the top choice of those who frequent the lunch at The Durning House. Among the many desserts that are offered, Heath says that they make Coconut Pie by far the most. Upon that lunch, Bailey made such an impression on the owners that they recruited her on the spot to start working for them in Van Alstyne.

"The best part of working here is that it's a family." said Bailey. "They are my bosses but they are truly my family. I love them and everyone here."

Bailey stayed and worked for Conrads for three more years while working in Van Alstyne on the weekends, but The Durning House owners persuaded Bailey to work full-time South Grayson County.

"I would like to stay here until I

can't do my job anymore." said Bailey. "I truly love my job. There's not anything I don't love about it."

Being there for 24 years, Bailey has met so many people and some of her favorite customers have passed.

"Being here so long, you form relationships with these people. You know everything about them. My customers are so sweet. took in from the 35 yard line. Howe led 28-7 with 8:35 in the third quarter.

A punt by the Bulldogs and fumbles on consecutive plays by S&S and Howe gave the Rams the ball at their own 44 yard line. Maher capped off a 56-yard drive with a one-yard plunge to cut the Howe lead to 28-13 at the 3:42 mark in the third quarter.

The toe-punching S&S kicker, Casey Welch has a big leg, but made one mistake in not kicking it deep enough on the ensuing kickoff. Hawthorne caught the ball at the ten and floated a few yards before he found a seam and took the ball 90-yards for the return. That gave the Bulldogs a healthy 35-13 lead with 3:29 on the 3rd quarter clock.

S&S would answer right back with a 62-yard drive that end on Mahler's third rushing touchdown of the night. This was came from 14 yards out with 1:18left in the third to cut the Howe lead to 35-19 after the missed PAT.

The Bulldogs next possession started at their own 44 yard line and Carroll finished it off with a 34-yard touchdown to give Howe a 42-19 lead with 10:31 left in the game.

Loller then threw a 20-yard screen pass to Maher that put the Rams on the board again and ending a 56-yard drive of their own to cut the Howe

lead to 42-27 with 8:42 left.

Howe's Anthony Hawthorne would score his second rushing touchdown on the night and third overall with 4:09 left in the game to end a 53-yard drive that took 4:30 off of the fourth quarter clock. Howe went up 49-27 with that score.

That's when the coverage broke down on the kick team and S&S, who had ran reverses on several returns, faked a reverse and then threw a lateral to Devin Orr who made a nice move to make a couple of defenders miss and Orr raced the remaining yards to end the scoring on the night. The final score was 49-33.

Howe rushed for 332 yards on the ground. Hawthorne finished with 21 carries and 101 yards rushing. Carroll led all rushers with 136 yards on 13 carries. Tyler Gisham added 67 yards on eight carries.

Hawthorne had now rused for 1,143 yards on 175 carries on teh season. Carroll is next with 745 yards on 71 carries.

Howe travels to Whitewright next week to play in a trick or treat game on Halloween night. All indications are that it should be a treat for Bulldogs fans as Whitewright has lost five straight.

Fall Festival Raises Over \$7,000 For Groups

The Annual Fall Festival sponsored by the Howe PTA was a great success, according to Jacki Freeman, chairman. Earnings reported by the various groups totaled almost \$7,000.

The elementary school made \$3,466.38 total. Totals by grade were: Kindergarten - \$294.51; elementary P.E. - \$311.50; elementary office - \$72.45; first grade - \$296; second grade - \$172.40; third grade - \$136.41; fourth grade - \$265; Gifted & Talented - \$85.25; sweet shoppe - \$334.61; and grocery giveaway - \$1,473.25. Winners of the grocery giveaway were Margaret Williams and David Wortham.

The middle school total was \$1063.30. By grade the totals are: fifth - \$215.75; sixth - \$111.80; seventh - \$269.75;

eighth - \$400; and student council - \$66. High school classes and organizations raised a total of \$1886.12. Individual totals are sophomores - \$229.12; junior show - \$638; FFA - \$111; Ag Boosters - \$170; Band Boosters - \$339; Color Guards - \$120; Drill Team - \$225; and PTA - \$54.

Other organizations and their totals are: Cub Scouts - \$100; Lions Club - \$300; Texas Education Association - \$78.

The Fall Festival committee would like to thank the teachers and parents for working to make it such a success. Also a very special thank you to the Howe Volunteer Fire Dept. for washing off the parking lot after the festival.

Council Meets

The Howe City Council met Monday, Oct. 23, for their regular meeting. (The meeting was recessed from Thursday, Oct. 19, due to the fact that no quorum could be established.)

At the Oct. 19 meeting a public hearing was held on the Planning Grant for the Sewer project. At the Monday meeting, the council approved

a resolution authorizing the mayor to act as the city's representative in the grant application.

The council also accepted the completion of work for

improvements on Well #2. Jerry Chapman of GTUA noted that the contractor is being penalized a total of \$4300 for not completing the project on time (this is \$100 a day for 43 days). City Administrator Eric Kuykendall stated that the well improvements are beneficial to the town during a water outage problem allowing the system to recharge in less than an hour. (Previously the system took 3 to 8 hours to recharge.) A one-year warranty on the well improvements began on Sept. 26, 1989.

Police report for Sept. 21-Oct. 19: 5 arrests, 83 tickets written, 20 warnings, 10 complaints, 7 motorist assists, 7 police department assists, 7 open doors/alarms, 5 disturbances, 1 cattle on roadway, 1 burglary, 2 accident, 1 prowler calls, 1 theft report, 3 vandalism reports, 2 dog complaints. Miles per 24 hour patrol averaged 131.8.

Municipal court report for September: 69 traffic violations, 1 city ordinance violation, 17 trials, 11 defensive driving granted, 9 warrants issued. Fines paid: to city-\$2,767.50 and to state-\$483 for total of \$3250.50.

In his report, Kuykendall noted that the outside maintenance supervisor has resigned and he (Kuykendall) will assume his duties for the time being since during the winter the outside work load is lighter. There was also discussion of a water meter that needs to be moved to the property owners lot.

In other business the council approved on second reading an ordinance raising water and sewer rates and one making a no parking zone on West Turt.

On the matter of changing the name of Farmington Rd., the council had received seven letters requesting that the name not be changed and the council took no action on this item.

The 1988-89 budget was amended and the council also approved a resolution to join other cities in reference to the TU Electric rate increase case.

Request from the fire dept. for additional funds. The city gives a TD from the fire dept. \$8500 each year. Fire Chief Bert Dowlen had requested an increase, partly due to the need to get more training and certification.

Mayor Ray Bledsoe suggested the council look at the matter in about six months after they see what the new budget will have. Council member Billy Joe Wheeler said he wished the city had more money for the fire dept. but added he feels street repair should be the city's first priority. Council agreed to look at the fire dept. budget in six months to try to find additional money to help with the training.


Pep Rally

The Howe High School Band competed in the District Marching Contest on Wednes-



day, Oct. 11, at West Mesquite Stadium and received a Division I rating, the highest rating possible. Howe was the third 2A band competing at the contest, performing at 1:05 p.m.

Bulldogs Shut Out Pottsboro, 41-0

Quarterback Jay Skipworth passed for 302 yards and four touchdowns out of the run-and-shoot to help the Bulldogs shut out Pottsboro, 41-0, Friday, Oct. 20.

The victory puts the Dogs alone at the top of District 11-AA with a 2-0 mark and improves their season record to 4-3.

Skipworth, who has topped the 1,000 yard mark this season with 1291 yards, was named offensive player of the week by the SHERMAN DEMOCRAT Monday, Oct. 23. His season total of TD passes is now at 15.

"Our passing game was hot, it was really there," said Coach Jim Fryar. "We took advantage of it early in the ball game."

The coach noted that several receivers were catching Skipworth's passes. David Cannaday had five for 68 yards and a TD. Jerry Covington caught four for 117 yards and a TD. Steven Hawthorne caught four for 67 yards and two touchdowns and Monte Walker caught four for 68 yards.

"The fact that we're hitting several different receivers makes the defense guard all over the football field," Fryar said.

In the first quarter of play, Skipworth tossed TD passes to Hawthorne of 21 and 17 yards each. Hawthorne also kicked the PAT's after each TD to give the Dogs an early 14-0 lead.

In the second quarter Skipworth passed to Covington for a 57-yard TD pass. Then

Clint Bray, who carried the ball 19 times for 117 yards, scored a TD from 21 yards out. The final TD of the first half was scored on a 1-yard pass from Skipworth to Cannaday. Two of the three PAT kicks by Hawthorne were good for the 34-0 lead at the half.

In the third quarter Bray added another TD from 3 yards out and Hawthorne's kick was good, bringing the score to 41-0.
