It's been four years since the Howe Bulldogs have been able to celebrate the clinching of a playoff berth. It is quite the turnaround by Head Coach Zack Hudson, who is now 8-11 as the leader of the Bulldogs (5-4, 3-1).

The 38-0 clinching win over Whitewright came with a hefty price however, as slot

back Stratton Carroll and defensive tackle Joel Menjivar each left with season-ending injuries. Both players suffered a torn ACL (Anterior Cruciate Ligament) in their right knee. The Bulldogs will have to test their depth which is usually thin at the small school level.

offensive work-load to increase as well as also more use of Tyler Grisham.

Carroll immediately got the 'Dogs on the board Friday night on the first play of the game. Howe took the ball at their own 38 yard line and he raced around the edge for 62-yards to put Howe up 7-0 with only 20 seconds off of the clock.

Whitewright (3-6, 0-4), couldn't get much going all night against the stingy Bulldog defense led by Ty Portman (who also left the game with a re-injured hip). The Tigers' Dylan Kendrick had a perfect punt to the Howe one yard line. After a two-yard gain by Anthony Hawthorne, Joaquin Lopez ran a quarterback keeper behind the right guard Kiefer Rodgers and outran the Tiger defender to score a 97-

yard touchdown. The 97-yarder qualified as the second longest run in school history. Randy Geer owns that record at 98 yards. He accomplished that feat in both 1982 and 1983 (Geer also had a 95 and a 92-yarder).

With Howe leading 14-0 with 7:00 left in the first quarter, Whitewright kept the ball for nearly two minutes, but turned the ball over on downs.

Hawthorne would score his first of two touchdowns on the night. The first was from 43-yards out and gave Howe the early 21-0 lead with 3:22 left in the first quarter.

Whitewright once again turned the ball over on downs to Howe. That set up a 53-yard drive that was capped off by a one-yard touchdown run by Hawthorne. That gave Howe the 28-0 lead as

the drive entered the second quarter.

The Tigers fumbled on their next possession which gave Howe the ball at their own 27 yard line. The 'Dogs took 2:59 off of the clock on their way to a drive-ending field goal by Brice Honaker, a 25-yarder to give Howe a comfortable 31-0 halftime lead.

In a peculiar deferral of the initial coin toss before the game, Whitewright took the ball on the opening possession of the second half, which resulted in a punt. Howe, then marched on a 84-yard drive that ended when Brandon Wall broke free from the 34 yard line to up the Bulldogs score to 38-0 with 3:45 left in the third quarter.

The remainder of the game was a battle to kill the clock and get everyone out of the game healthy, but as mentioned, two key players were lost to season-ending injuries and that left a bad taste in what should've been a huge clinching celebration.

Carroll finished the game as the leading rusher with 151 yards on seven carries and one touchdown. Hawthorne was next with his 105 yards on 17 carries and two touchdowns. Lopez finished with 101 yards on four carries and one touchdown. Tyler Grisham chipped in 56 yards on 10 carries.

On the season, Hawthorne is the leading rusher with 1,248 yards and 17 touchdowns. Carroll is next with 896 and eight touchdowns. Grisham has 468 yards and two touchdowns.

## JV improves to 7-2 record

The Howe Bulldog JV team upped their season record to 7-2 Thursday night October 30 after a 38-6 victory over the Whitewright Tigers in their final home game of the year. The 'Dogs started the game strong with Cooper Akins taking the opening kickoff down to the Tigers 37 yard line. After driving down to the Tiger one yard line, Brent Masters scored the opening touchdown and Jaden Matthews ran in the two point conversion to put the 'Dogs up 8-0. Howe driving down the field on their second possession of the game but fumbled on the Tigers' 37 yard line with the Tigers recovering. Akins intercepted a Whitewright pass and sprinted 60-yards down the left sideline for the touchdown. Winston Mosse scored the two-point conversion to make the score Bulldogs 16 Tigers 0 at the end of the first quarter. The Bulldogs defense continued to dominate the Tigers in the second quarter holding them scoreless while the Bulldogs scored twice in the second quarter.

Matthews scored on a 45-yard run and ran in the two-point conversion. Later in the quarter, Mosse scored on a 12-yard run and ran in the two-point conversion to put the 'Dogs in the lead at halftime with a score of 32-0.

The only scoring in the third quarter came on a Bulldog 53-yard drive which was capped off on a four-yard run by Matthews. The two point conversion failed but the Dogs held a 38-0 advantage over the Tigers. The Tigers finally got on the scoreboard in the 4th quarter on a 28 yard run but the two point conversion failed leaving final score 38-6 with the Bulldogs on top.

The Bulldogs won their third straight game and their record now stands at 7-2. The final game of the season will be played at 7:00 next Thursday November 7 against the Leonard Tigers in Leonard.

## Van Alstyne City Hall hangs on voters

It's good to know your neighbor and it's always best to be on good terms with the one that could knock your fence down and then claim high winds. Neighbors usually mind their own business, but when there seems to be a lot of screaming and bickering coming from over the fence, we seem to get a little nosy.

The Van Alstyne Chamber of Commerce held a Town Hall Meeting on Tuesday, October 28 to discuss highly controversial city government issues that have created a buzz around town and online.

The biggest matter-at-hand is that some citizens led by Kaaren Teuber are in favor for complete removal of the current council-manager form of government in favor of a strong-mayor form of government.

The council-manager form, like the one we have in Howe consists of elected council members and mayor. Those decision makers hire a city manager to conduct day-to-day operations (Theirs is Frank Baker; ours is Joe Shephard). In this form of government, the city manager can be dismissed of his or her job by the council members. The mayor has no voting power.

The proposed change to a strong-mayor form of government would allow for the elected mayor and elected council members. Under this structure, the mayor (with a salary) would obtain significant power over city operations and would even serve as the elected executive of the city.

Some very large cities and very small cities use the strong-mayor form of government. The large cities want better control from one voice instead of many, while small cities that can't find enough

willing council members usually find themselves in this form. Most medium size towns have the council-manager style.

In Tuesday night's meeting, Kaaren Teuber, a former city councilwoman began her speech to change the style of government on the basis of the citizens not having knowledge of what is and what isn't going on at Van Alstyne's City Hall.

"We are losing our personal freedoms because the city has been put in the hands of an unelected bureaucrat." said Teuber. "We, the people of Van Alstyne can't talk to our council members and express our point of view whether changes should be made or shouldn't be made."

Van Alstyne City Councilman Larry Cooper spoke in defense of the change of government. He says that those that want to get involved in city leadership should not think of themselves as a great individual, but as a gear in a gearbox. Cooper says that Van Alstyne needs to keep the council-manager form of government because it provides a strong checks and balances with three strong branches of government. He also stated that this is not the time to be reinventing city government.

"The city is evolving and the city government needs to evolve with it." said Cooper. "We cannot afford to take a backwards step. Our city government is not broken and it doesn't need to be overhauled."

Our neighbor next door is a good decent family with high standards. My kids are welcome there, but they sure can bicker pretty loudly.

Tigers (7-1, 3-1) to town next week to round out the regular season at home on senior night. The two teams will battle it out for second place in District 5-3A.

Howe and Leonard have played 25 times with Leonard winning 15 of them. The first game played between the schools came on October 20, 1961 when Leonard shutout Howe 43-0. Howe won seven in a row from 1991-2003, but have currently lost four in a row since 2004.

If the Bulldogs win on Friday night, the probable matchup in Bi-District would be with Alba-Golden (6-3, 2-2). A loss to Leonard on Friday would

make Howe the third seed and would most likely face the Cooper Bulldogs (6-3, 3-1) in the first round.

Howe has never played Alba-Golden, but is 1-7 vs. Cooper going back to the initial game in 1978. Howe's lone win over Cooper came in 1979 when Howe won 6-0.

## Dog Bites

Howe's Head Coach Zack Hudson needs one more win to tie Arthur Boyle with nine wins.

Howe's 413 yards rushing was only the third most this season.

When Howe rushes for more than 206 yards, they are 5-0.

Howe has had two 100-yard rushers in each of the five wins.

# Faith

“God’s word is alive and active! It’s sharper than a double-edged sword. His word can cut and divide our spirit and soul and through our joints and marrow, until it discovers the desires and thoughts of our hearts.” Hebrews 4:12. God gives of His written word to change us. The Bible is alive so it seeks out our intentions. It speaks to us in a voice of compassion and conviction. As we read the Bible we see where we need to be spiritually. God's word is able to penetrate to the heart of a person and cause a change. That is why you find those hearing Peter's message responding, "Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart" Acts 2:37. The Bible is revealing. It is the discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart. No matter how well hidden we hold sinful thoughts the Word of God lays open our secrets and tendencies that we share with no one. We need to be convicted of sin so that we will repent and change. This is why the Holy Spirit uses the word for our benefit.

A two-edged sword is sharp but God's word is even sharper because it can make a distinction between things we generally think of as being indistinguishable like the difference between a soul and a spirit. Your soul is your mind, your will and your emotions. Your spirit is the human ability in you that allows you to have an intimate relationship with God. (John 4:24) Our spirit is dead to understanding the things of God until we are born again in Christ. God’s word sees the difference between a person's thoughts and their intent? God

sees through to the heart and His word makes us realize which is true. A two edge sword is considered to be a very dangerous weapon. It can cut the one fighting with it just as easily as their opponent. If the Bible is used as a weapon to point out the flaws in another person, the person using it often finds himself convicted by the same words. "But how can you teach others when you refuse to learn yourself? You preach that a man should not steal, but do you steal? You say, "Do not commit adultery," but are you faithful? You hate idols, but do you rob temples?" Romans 2:21-22.

Your friends and your family will likely support you even when you’re wrong; but God's Word will convict you if you are wrong. The Word of God will reveal the thoughts and intents of your heart as Hebrews 4:12 teaches. If you want to find someone to sympathize or agree with you, that is easy to do. But if you want to please God, then you need to open the Bible and search for the truth.



## R.O.L.L.



**Tyson Dever spoke to Howe students about tragedy and recovery**

Tyson Dever had was a college baseball player at Texas State University in San Marcos. As any typical student at spring break, he was headed to the beach in South Texas and was on his way to pick up his girlfriend. That's when Dever's life changed in the snap of a finger.

On March 11, 2005, Tyson Dever survived a car accident that left him paralyzed from the waist down. On that day, Tyson lost his ability to walk and life as he knew it changed forever. What Tyson gained was a desire to inspire people to be determined in life and to live life completely. He gave an inspiring talk to both the middle school and high school on Monday that kicked off Red Ribbon Week, which is a campaign to raise

awareness for the prevention of drugs and alcohol.

On that fateful day, Dever took back roads to his girlfriends house in order to try and avoid the I-35 traffic.

"I'm on a two-lane road in the right-hand lane waiting on on-coming traffic so I can make a left-hand turn in my girlfriend's neighborhood." said Dever. "Behind me is a single cab pickup truck. He got tired of waiting and drove around the shoulder and got back in front of me. What came right behind him was a fully-loaded cement truck driving 70 miles per hour. I don't know whether he didn't see me, or maybe his brakes failed, or maybe he just flat-out wasn't paying attention, I don't know. He hit my car

from behind like a monster truck."

The impact actually threw Dever's car into on-coming traffic and he was hit twice. Somehow, conscious, he remembered being trapped inside the burning car. Luckily, the person in the single cab truck that had just passed saw the accident in the rearview mirror and came back to help but was unable to remove Dever by himself. That's when two gentlemen that worked for ESPN Radio came upon the scene.

One of the men reached in and grabbed his belt. The other guy picked up the door panel that was laying on the ground and jumped in the burning car and shielded the flame with the door panel while the other guys were able to pull Dever out of the car.

"There's no doubt in my mind that if those guys do no risk their life to try and save me, there's a great chance that I'm not here today telling my story." said Dever.

As soon as Dever was pulled out of the car, it exploded like a Hollywood movie. A Fire and Rescue Team just so happened to be across the street from the accident and were there immediately. What would normally take nearly an hour with no traffic to get to downtown Austin, it took 14 minutes from the accident until surgery.

"Guys, the only way I can explain it to you today is that it wasn't my time to go." said Dever. "My work here is not done."

Dever had five surgeries the first day and was

paralyzed at the waist with a one percent chance to ever walk again. He went through extensive rehab and five months after the accident, he was back in college finishing his degree and only missed a half of semester in school.

"I wasn't different from anybody in this gym right now." said Dever. "I played football and baseball in high school and played college baseball for a couple of years. I was going to school to teach and coach. But in a matter of the time it takes to snap your finger, my plans changed forever over something that wasn't even my fault. I can't go back to March 11, 2005 and change what happened. I can't do it. But it's my responsibility to look forward."

Dever gave the talk to the students about changes that will come in their life and it's not what happens as much as how they react to it.

Dever explained that the first thing people notice about him wherever he goes is the wheelchair. But he told the students that no one should feel sorry for him because he's accomplished more since he's been in a wheelchair than he ever did before.

Dever told a story about a coach who instead of making them run at practice as usual, surprised the team by giving each member a card with a quote on it. Some of the players tossed it in the trash, but Dever kept his in his wallet. During the accident, everything had burned. His wallet was in the console and all of the money and credit cards and social security card had burned.

"Laying on top of my wallet as if someone had placed it there was that little laminated card that Coach gave me at practice." said Dever.

Dever was an inspiration to not only middle school and high schoolers, but to everyone there.




parade could come through the downtown area. The floats will then go through downtown and make a left on King Street and return to Thompson Gym.

### Fire Chief Urges Voters To Approve Two Propositions

Howe Fire Chief Bert Dowlen is urging Howe citizens to vote FOR two proposed amendments on the Nov. 7 ballot - these two propositions are #17 and #15.

The proposed constitutional amendment, Proposition 17 on the ballot, authorizes the creation of an emergency fund for the fire service of Texas and does so without an increase in taxes or fees.

This fund can be used by all fire departments of the state, paid or volunteer, large or

small. The fund may be used only for training and equipment and will be distributed on a priority basis with the most urgent needs being served first.

The fund will be administered by a board under the direction of the State Fire Marshall's office. The seven member board, appointed by the governor, will include fire members representing the fire service and two members representing the general public and will serve without pay.

If approved by a majority of Texas voters, the fund will address the serious problem of funding for the almost 2,000 fire departments in the state. Fire departments across the state will be eligible to approve or low interest loans or grants in an effort to address unnecessary deaths and injuries as well as the needless loss of property due to fire which could be prevented with better training and equipment. During 1987, 322 Texas died in fires which caused \$486,000 in damages.

Dowlen also urges area voters to vote FOR Proposition #15 which will allow charitable, non-profit groups to legally hold raffles. (At present these are illegal, although in most cases no one prosecutes the non-profit groups for holding raffles.)

### Bulldogs Shut Out S&S Rams, 47-0

The Howe Bulldogs recorded their second shutout in a row and their fifth victory of the season with a 47-0 victory over the S&S Rams Friday night, Oct. 27.

The Dogs are 3-0 in District 11AA and in sole possession of first place. This Friday they will travel to Van Alstyne for a crucial game. A win will give Howe first place in the district, but a loss would throw the two teams into a three-way tie with Celina. A coin toss would be used to determine which two teams would advance to the playoffs.

The Bulldog defense allowed S&S 9 first downs and 120 yards total offense while the Bulldog offense rolled up 32 first downs and 437 yards offense.

S&S took the opening kickoff, but on their first two series were able to manage only one first down.

Howe's first possession also fell flat. But with 6:43 left in the first quarter Howe took over at their own 14 and advanced the ball to the goal line in 14 plays with two penalties on S&S and one on Howe slowing the action. With 4:23 left in the quarter, David Cannaday caught an 11-yard TD pass from quarterback Jay Skipworth. Steven Hawthorne added a PAT kick for a 7-0 score.

The Rams took the ball at their own 30 but two plays later Wade Carson intercepted a Ram pass midfield. Monte Walker carried the ball for a

first down and a pass from Skipworth to Cannaday added another first down at the Ram 8-yard line. A penalty against S&S for offside put the ball at the 4 and on the next play Clint Bray carried the ball into the end zone. Hawthorne's kick once more sailed between the goal posts for a 14-0 score with 2:04 left in the first quarter.


As the first quarter ended and the second began, S&S gained some good yardage and threatened the Bulldogs as they advanced to the Howe 26-yard line. Then a clipping penalty on the Rams moved the ball back and on the next play James Boatman and Jon Norwood sacked the Ram quarterback for another loss. The Rams lost their momentum and had to punt on downs.

The Dogs, aided by a pass interference penalty on the Rams, advanced to the S&S 34, but fumbled the ball away. The Rams were unable to gain yardage this time, and Howe took over play at their own 31. A personal foul penalty on the Rams moved the ball to the Howe 46. Skipworth threw two passes to Jerry Covington for first downs at the Ram 42 and 15. The next pass was caught in the end zone by Cannaday. The PAT was blocked. With 5:57 left in the first half, Howe was ahead 20-0.

The Rams managed one first down in their next series, but another quarterback sack, this time by Blair Nelson and Boatman, stalled the play. Howe gained some yardage but had to punt with just seconds left on the clock for the halftime.

As the third quarter began, Brian Pettit took the kickoff, was almost stopped by a Ram but pulled loose and ran the ball close to the 50. Skipworth connected on a couple of passes to advance the ball and then Covington caught a 33-yard TD pass. Hawthorne added another point with a PAT kick. With 10:17 left in the third quarter, Howe was up 27-0.

After gaining two first downs, S&S was once more forced to punt on downs. Howe took control at their own 33. Skipworth tossed passes of 17, 14, and 16 yards consecutively to give Howe first downs. After an offside penalty on S&S, Hawthorne caught a 4-yard TD pass and then kicked a perfect PAT to bring the score to 34-0 with 5:32 left in the third

S&S gained a little ground, but again punted on downs. With 2:40 left in the third quarter, Howe took possession at their own 45. Bray carried for 9 yards and Pettit carried for a first down at the Ram 37. Three plays later, Cannaday caught a 31-yard TD pass and Hawthorne added the kick to bring the score to 41-0 with 59 seconds left in the third quarter.

Jared Powell was in on a quarterback sack to stall the Rams on their next series and Howe took control as the fourth period was just getting underway. Wade Carson took over as quarterback and guided the team toward the end zone, but the Dogs were stalled around the Ram 40-yard line.

After four more tries to move the ball, S&S had to punt. Howe gained control at the Ram 43. An unsportsmanlike conduct penalty against the Rams advanced the ball for Howe and four plays later Bray carried the ball across the line from 13 yards out. The PAT kick failed and with 2:52 left in the game, Howe led 47-0.

The Rams could find no running room on their next four plays and Howe controlled the ball as the clock ran out. The Howe Bulldogs will play Van Alstyne there Friday, Nov. 3, at 7:30 p.m. The Panthers are 1-2 in district, having lost to Celina and beaten Tom Bean and Pottsboro.
