The Cooper Bulldogs (7-4) came into the game on a roll by winning four in a row in District 6-3A. Their only losses on the season were to Farmersville, Tom Bean and Lone Oak. The Howe Bulldogs (6-5), on the other hand, came into the game just off of the heels of an overtime loss to Leonard and losing three starters for the season due to injury. That proved not to be a deterrent, as Howe took a lead just before the half and never looked back.

The Howe Bulldogs won the coin-toss and elected to defer to the second half, which

most teams that view themselves with an upper-echelon defense, so often do. That first decision by Head Coach Zack Hudson proved to be a very good one later on in the game.

Cooper took the ball first and started at the Howe 48 yard line. On the first drive, Cooper's running back tandem of Ira Franklin and Tristan Jones displayed a one-two punch that would be a very dangerous threat. Cooper went all 48 yards in 3:23 and Jones began the scoring of the 2014 playoffs by rushing for a 15-yard touchdown. He was then stopped on the two-point conversion attempt and Cooper led Howe 6-0 with 8:37 left in the first quarter.

Howe's first offensive possession started at their own 28 yard line and eventually stalled out

and Charles Overbey boomed a punt that would send Cooper starting their next possession at their own 16 yard line. Franklin, with his slender frame and quick moves, quickly ended up fumbling the ball in which Levi Mrozinski picked up for Howe at the Cooper 37 yard line.

Tyler Grisham ran two consecutive plays to left side of the offense trailing his lineman Keifer Rodgers, Tanner Hartsfield, Overbey and Josh Griffin. The second carry produced a 15-yard touchdown. Freshman kicker Brice Honaker booted through the PAT and Howe took the 7-6 lead with 2:38 left in the first quarter.

Cooper's next possession started at their own 42 yard line and quickly marched the length of the field in less than a minute when Jones scored his second touchdown of the night. This one was from five yards out. Jones also added the two-point conversion to give Cooper the 14-7 lead with 1:53 left in the first.

Howe started the following drive from their own 41 yard line with 1:53 left before the half. To this point, Howe's 1,454 yard leading rusher, Anthony Hawthorne had been fairly quiet, however on a 4th and one, his 38-yard touchdown would make the north side bleachers of Jackie Hendricks Stadium in Princeton scream loudly in the cold brisk evening. Honaker's PAT tied the game at 14 with 9:07 left in the second quarter.

For the first time on the evening, Cooper was held to a punt on their next possession, which gave Howe the ball at their own 12 yard line. Howe drove down the field and took nearly five

for Howe and the opportunity for growth has once again resurfaced with developers starting projects in the southern tip of the city.

The new members met in the council chambers along with Howe Mayor Jeff Stanley and Howe Economic Development Director Monte Walker for over an hour to discuss and formulate a plan that would set Howe's chamber profile in full swing.

Four of the five members walked away with titles as Robert Cannaday was elected president of the Howe Chamber of Commerce. Cannaday is a graduate of the University of North Texas with a BA in Economics and is currently a credit analyst for Independent Bank and has been employed there since 2011.

He's the son of John and Debbie Cannaday and is the grandson of Robby and Marty Cannaday.

"I had been wanting to become more involved in the community but hadn't seen anything that fit my strengths and interests until I saw the (4B) posting." said Cannaday. "In college, I spent quite a bit of time studying urban economics and became very interested in how

cities functioned and what really supported long term success (human capital) and what it took to attract and retain these assets."

Sheryl Bentley, Realtor of the Ebby Halliday Realtors was selected vice president. Jonathan Coleman is the Music Minister at First Baptist Church of Howe was elected secretary. Haleen Parrish of The School Zone Academy in Howe is was voted as treasurer. Tom Defrange, owner of TLD Design Consulting, LLC in Howe rounds out the five board members of the Howe Chamber of Commerce.

The group will meet on December 1 to discuss bylaws and of the direction and role they will play with the city. In attendance is expected to be Sherman Chamber of Commerce President Eddie Brown along with Anna Chamber of Commerce Connie Christianson to help, guide and give council to the five-member panel.

The group discussed membership drives and big rewards for those that join early. Ideas that came to the table were once-per-month mix and mingle receptions and once-per-month networking breakfasts. The group believes that a strong return on investment should be overall driving force for a buisness to joining the reformed Howe Chamber of Commerce.

Traditions of the former Howe Chamber will be continued, such as the annual award in the name of Norma J. Wallace.

The chamber will be responsible for taking over some of the events that Keep Howe Beautiful have been tackling. The new chamber is already responsible for bringing a band to downtown Howe on the eventing of Founders Day which will be held on April 25.

Honaker's PAT lifted Howe in the lead with only :36 left before the half. Cooper was unable to move the ball in the last seconds of the half and Howe took a 21-14 lead to the locker room.

Hudson's decision to defer to the second half proved deadly to Cooper as Howe took the ball first out of the locker room with a lead. Hawthorne received the kick and returned it all the way to the Cooper 28 yard line. Howe marched down the the four yard line and the coaching staff made a call that showed their confidence in young

sophomore Brandon Wall when his number was called to take it over the goal line from the four yard line. Wall, replacing the injured Stratton Carroll scored his second touchdown of the season since Carroll's departure. Howe bumped up the lead to 27-14 with Wall's score. The PAT was low and partially blocked.

The ensuing kickoff by Howe proved to disaster for the Cooper Bulldogs. Colton Strode caught and dropped the kick and Grisham recovered the ball at the Cooper 24 yard line. Howe had an opportunity to blow the doors off of Cooper's chances, but Hawthorne fumbled in the end zone and Cooper recovered and took over at their own 20.

Cooper, just moments earlier were facing elimination squarely in the




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Economic Development Director spends three days marketing Howe

Howe Economic Development Director Monte Walker spent last week in Dallas at an ICSC (International Council of Shopping Centers) convention, which is a trade organization for the international shopping center industry.

In the convention were cities from all over Texas and retailers from all over the U.S. trying to get together to make deals for future expansion from both sides.

This was the first time that Howe has attended the event and Walker learned a lot from other cities that have already gone through the growth process.

"There are cities out there that were just like us only a few years ago," Walker said. "They've formulated a plan and carried through with it over the past few years and have been able to control the growth that could've overwhelmed them."

Walker says that cities like Roanoke and Forney have recently been able to make major adjustments to their city by investing in out-of-the-box ideas that have lured the growth that they were seeking instead of the growth that they weren't particularly


looking for. Roanoke was a destination for Hawaiian Falls and City Manager Scott Campbell said that the relationship with the city and the water park has been a dream venture for the city and the citizens and kicked off a tax base for Roanoke that allowed for other developments in the downtown district.

On Friday, approximately 200 retail companies set up booths to try and do business with cities, real estate brokers and other investment opportunities. Walker met with over 100 retailers to lay the foundation and either introduce them to Howe or more familiarize them with Howe.

Of the 100 retailers, Walker met with were Quick Trip, Racetrack, Whataburger, Carl's Jr., Taco Bell, Pizza Hut and Tom Thumb.

"It was a rapid-fire introduction. It was what I envision speed dating would be like," said Walker. "You stand in line and wait your turn and when you get that opportunity to talk to the right person, you better make an immediate impression."

Walker will be meeting with other cities in the ensuing weeks for strategic planning and idea sharing.

announced the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. Fighting back tears, Cargill said that his two older brothers enlisted the very next day. In World War II, 405,399 young men and women perished. This included the Sullivan brothers that Cargill knew as a child in Southern Iowa that were 20 miles from his home. They lost five brothers from the same family. They were lost on the USS Juneau (CL-52) that sunk at the Naval Battle of Guadalcanal 13 November 1942.

He mentioned World War I, which was his father and uncle's war. 116,516 lost their life in that ugly battle. Vietnam was his younger brother's war, which resulted in 58,209 deaths. Korea was the war in which Cargill served. 36,526 lost their lives fighting for the U.S. in that particular war.

"I watched as my close friend didn't make it. His plane went in and he couldn't get out." said Cargill."

The Revolutionary War and the War of 1812 comined for 40,000 casualties. The Mexican-American War of 1846 saw 13,283 lose their life.

He listed the War on Terror in the top ten as it started in 2001 and is still going on. Casualties to date are 6,717. Philippine–American War in 1899 lost 4,196.

"This impact is hard to grasp from history books and statistics." said Cargill. "One has to walk the grass of the Punchbowl in Honolulu where 13,000 of our finest are buried in the South West Pacific theatre. Or stand on the structure above the Arizona. The oil is still percolating to the surface from the Arizona even to this day. 1,102 of our finest sailors were entombed on December 7, 1941. Or walk Arlington Cemetery, where 400,000 are buried and more are being buried every day. Especially in section 60 where the ones out of Afghanistan are buried."

Cargill said that if you add up all that have fallen in all of the wars and divide them by the stars on the flag, you will find for every star at least 17,000 young men and women have given their lives for this country and the freedom we enjoy.

"As we gather to honor and pay respects to all who have departed this life, it is fitting to remember first our great nation." said Cargill. "We have been given a rich and beautiful land. May we appreciate it, treasure the freedoms that is our gift and our heritage. And may we never forget the geat price for which it was purchased for us. May we remember all who served in the armed forces of our nation today. Renew with vigor the efforts of all who have the responsibility to care for our ill, wounded, and those languishing in our VA hospitals today."

Cargill read a part of Abraham Lincoln's famous Gettysburg Address, "But in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate, we cannot consecrate, we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead who struggled here have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us – that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion – that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain, that this nation under God shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, for the people shall not perish from the earth."

Cargill finished his speech with, "God Bless Texas and God Bless America."

Veteran and Howe coach Bruce Elvington then gave a history lesson on The Pledge of Allegiance. The original Pledge of Allegiance was written in September of 1892 by Francis Bellamy as part of the 1892 celebration of Columbus Day. Congress officially recognized the pledge in 1942, but in 1943 the Supreme Court ruled that the public school students couldn't be forced to recite it. In 1954, after lobbying from the Knights of Columbus, the words "Under God" were added to the pledge. At the time, President Eisenhower stated "From this day forward, the millions of our school children will daily proclaim in every city and town, every village and rural school house, the dedication of our nation and our people to the Almighty.... In this way we are reaffirming the transcendence of religious faith in

America's heritage and future; in this way we shall constantly strengthen those spiritual weapons which forever will be our country's most powerful resource, in peace or in war."

The Supreme Court has avoided the addressing the constitutionality of "Under God" in the pledge, instead opting to insert the legality of The Pledge of Allegiance in general. The basic argument is since reciting the pledge is a free will choice, it does not infringe on a citizen's freedom of speech or religion.

The pledge has been recited daily for over 120 years by children and adults. Elvington then played a Red Skelton audio skit from January of 1969 from which he explained the meaning of each and every word of The Pledge of Allegiance. This can be found on the web.

In Skelton's final words on this subject, he spoke that two words have been added to the pledge since he was a boy, the words "Under God" were added and it would be a pity for them to be eliminated from our schools.

The Howe High School band played Taps and then Armed Forces Pride of America. Each veteran stood while their branch song was played.

This is an annual event put on by the National Honor Society of Howe ISD. The veterans were treated to a luncheon in the Dr. Wayne King Library after the presentation.

The speaker, Bill Cargill, is a chaplain for the American Legion in Van Alstyne and former Commander in the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He served with the Anti-Submarine Squadron during the Korean War. He retired as Chief Auditor for Lockheed Martin Space Systems Division in Sunnyvale and currently resides in McKinney with his wife Sonja.

face, now had life and captured that desperation and drove 80 yards and took 4:20 off of the third quarter clock. Jones scored his third touchdown of the night when he dove across from two yard line. Cooper once again came up short on the two-point conversion attempt as Franklin fumbled and Overbey recovered. Howe held to a 27-20 lead with 3:43 left in the third quarter.

Howe's next possession started at the Cooper 32 yard line as possibly the worst high school kick in the history of game happened. Cooper's kicker Colby Early tried to boot an onside kick to surprise Howe, but he miss hit the ball and it actually rolled backwards eight yards to the 32.

Howe choked 5:03 out the clock and facing a fourth down and goal at the four and already leading by one score, Hudson elected to let the young freshman

attempt a 21-yard field goal. Honaker's low kicked just sneaked over the post and Howe took a commanding 10 point lead with 10:40 left in the game. That field goal gave Howe 30 points in the game, which is now the most points ever scored in a playoff game by Howe. The previous high of 28 had been done vs. Royce City in 1989 and vs. Pilot Point in 1998.

Cooper took the ball at their own 46 yard line and drove down the field and looked primed to score, but quarterback McGraw was intercepted by Mrozinski at the Howe 15 yard line.

Only moments later, Grisham, with his only flaw of the evening, fumbled at the Howe 29 yard line in which Early recovered at the 5:32 mark in the fourth quarter. After driving 3:21 to the Howe 31 yard line, Cooper faced a fourth and four. McGraw rolled out to

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the right after faking the reverse, but was brought down by a great play on the edge. That gave the ball back to Howe with 2:09 on the clock and the celebration happened moments later as time progressed to zero.

With the Howe win, they advance to play Hughes Springs next Friday night in Van Memorial Stadium in Van, Texas at 7:30. Howe will be the home team, but will be wearing all white.

Hawthorne once again led all Howe rushers with 138 yards on 28 carries. He now has 1,592 yards on the season for the Bulldogs. Grisham added 101 on 18 carries. His 2014 total is 589 yards. Hawthorne and Grisham are both

averaging more than 6.2 yards per carry on the season.

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

The Howe Bulldogs, District 11AA champions, ended the regular season with a 39-16, victory over the Tom Bean Tom Cats, Friday, Nov. 10, bringing their district record to a perfect 5-0.

Coach Jim Fryar was absent from the game Friday night due to death of his mother. The team was keenly aware of his absence and it showed in their playing, especially during the first half of the game.

Following the game Supt. Pete Simmons and HHS Principal Don Gilstrap presented the District 11-AA championship trophy to team captains Thomas Troxtell, Jay Skipworth, and David Cannaday. Troxtell said that the team is dedicating the 1989 season along with their victory over Tom Bean to Coach Fryar in honor of his mother.

Tom Bean took the opening kickoff and managed only one first down before punting the ball to Howe. The Dogs and the Tom Cats traded possession on the next series with neither team gaining any ground. Then with 7:11 left in the first period Howe took control at their own 20. Clint Bray carried for 3 yards and then Skipworth connected with Steven Hawthorne on a pass for a first down at the Howe 40. A personal foul penalty on the Tom Cats moved the ball to the Tom Bean 45. Bray carried for a first down and Hawthorne and Cannaday each caught passes for first downs. Then with the ball at the 5-yard line Cannaday caught a pass in the end zone to put Howe on the scoreboard, 6-0, with 4:06 left in the first period. Hawthorne's kick for the PAT was blocked.

The Tom Cat managed one first down on their next series but punted from their own 33. Howe took control at their 40. After 4 plays the Dogs punted but a roughing the kicker penalty on the Tom Cats gave

Howe a 4th down and 1 situation at their own 49. On the next play Bray sprinted 51 yards through the Tom Cats and into the end zone. Hawthorne's kick was good for a 13-0 lead for Howe with 11:43 left in the first half.

Then suddenly Tom Bean caught fire as they completed a long pass for a first down at the Howe 25 and then another in the end zone, but the TD was called back on a penalty. A quarterback sack by the Bulldog defense stalled the drive. Howe took the punt a their own 1-yard line and managed two first downs, one on a pass from Skipworth to Hawthorne at the Howe 26 and then Brian Pettit carried the ball to the Howe 37. On the next play Tom Bean intercepted Skipworth's pass and ran into the end zone. The PAT kick was good for a 13-7 score with 8:08 in the second quarter. Six seconds later Tom Bean scored a safety on the kick as Pettit was downed in the end zone. Then four plays later, with 6:41 left in the first half, Tom Bean scored again on a 43-yard pass. The kick was good to put the Tom Cats ahead, 16-13.
