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Interim Charges for House Committees

This week I will discuss the interim charges recently issued to the House Committee on County Affairs. Interim charges are the issues that the Speaker asks committees to study during the time between regular legislative sessions in order to make recommendations for legislation for the following legislative session. The charges are good indicators of what legislation the legislature will take up during the next session. Legislators rely on public input when crafting legislation, and it is important that they hear from people during the interim.

HOUSE COMMITTEE ON COUNTY AFFAIRS:

Examine population growth in Texas counties and the impact the growth has had on housing, available land resources, businesses in Texas, as well as the impact of growth on the state's economy. Evaluate Texas's preparedness to respond to future growth and ensure economic stability.

Continue oversight of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards and issues jails currently face, including the mental health of those in jail, and make recommendations for refinement or improvement of processes and programs.

Determine which counties have implemented a cite-and-summons policy, whether the policy has been effective in lessening overcrowding in county jails, and whether those cited by peace officers comply with the policy.

Study the implementation of SB 462 (83R), which reorganized the Texas statutes relating to specialty courts. Examine which counties currently have veterans courts, as well as veterans courts in other states, and determine how those programs are working and whether these courts provide additional services or resources for veterans. Make appropriate recommendations. (Joint charge with the House Committee on Defense and Veterans' Affairs)

Conduct legislative oversight and monitoring of the agencies and programs under the committee's jurisdiction and the implementation of relevant legislation passed by the 83rd Legislature. In conducting this oversight, the committee should: consider any reforms to state agencies to make them more responsive to Texas taxpayers and citizens; identify issues regarding the agency or its governance that may be appropriate to investigate, improve, remedy, or eliminate; determine whether an agency is operating in a transparent and efficient manner; and identify opportunities to streamline programs and services while maintaining the mission of the agency and its programs.

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LIVING WATER

More Than Medals

The 2014 Winter Olympics recently ended with the host country, Russia, winning the medal count. Russia won 13 golds and 33 total medals, becoming the first Winter Olympic host nation to lead gold- and total-medal counts since Norway in 1952. The country has celebrated the victories of their medalists and recently congratulated them with more than just the honor of earning the medals.

On Thursday, February 27, Russian Prime Minister Dmitry Medvedev handed out keys to a fleet of white Mercedes-Benz cars to 44 of the Russian medalists next to Red Square in Moscow. Three different classes of cars were offered for the three medal colors. Each of the cars was adorned with the Russian Olympic Team logo.

What about the medal-winning athletes like figure skating champions Yuliya Lipnitskaya (age 15) and Adelina Sotnikova (age 17), who are under the minimum driving age of 18 (in Russia)? According to the Associated Press, those without licenses also received a paid-for driver.

These Olympic athletes received more than nice new cars. The cars came on top of cash prizes. Gold medalists received \$120,000, silver medalists \$76,000 and bronze medalists \$52,000, according to R-Sport. *

Yet all of the medals and the additional prizes cannot compare with the "reward" that is promised for faithful followers of Christ...

Against the backdrop of Olympic-like games in Greece, the Apostle Paul wrote to Christians in Corinth: "Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last; but we do it to get a crown that will last forever" (1 Corinthians 9:25). James also wrote about the crown that awaits the faithful child of God: "Blessed is the man who perseveres under trial, because when he has stood the test, he will receive the crown of life that God has promised to those who love him" (James 1:12). The "crown" is the reward of eternal life for those who follow Jesus!

The differences between the "crown of life" and Olympic medals (and all of the accolades and prizes that accompany the medals) are many. The main difference is: we cannot EARN the crown of life. The crown of life is received, not achieved. In fact, the basis of receiving the crown of life is not our flawless performance. That's wonderful news because "ALL have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). Each of us has fallen many more times than any figure skater – Olympic or otherwise! Just because our "performance" may be better than others doesn't earn the crown for us either.

The basis of receiving the crown of life is not our performance but what Someone else did for us. Despite our "falls" (our sins), God loves us so much that He gave His Son Jesus to die on the cross for our sins (1 Corinthians 15:1-4). Through His death on the cross on our behalf, Jesus paid the price for our redemption (Ephesians 1:7). Then three days later, He rose from the grave achieving victory over sin, Satan, and death!

To share in the victory of Christ and receive the crown of life, we must place our faith and trust in Jesus (Acts 16:30-31), turn from our sin in repentance (Acts 17:30-31), confess Him before men (Romans 10:9-10), and be baptized (immersed) into Christ for the forgiveness of our sins (Acts 2:38).

Then, as we continue to "fix our eyes on Jesus" (Hebrews 12:2) and follow Him faithfully (not flawlessly), He will continue to cleanse us from all $\sin(1 + 1.7)$ and, one day, give to us the crown of life (READ 2 Timothy 4:6-8).

The crown of life is worth far more than any "medals" this world has to offer. Jesus died so that you might receive this crown.

Our response should be to seek to please the One who DIED for us so that we might LIVE eternally!

Won't YOU accept His offer on His terms?



"I applied for renewal on-line and there was no problem," I replied.

"Why did I have to go down there?" she asked.

"Probably because your license expired after the new voter registration law became effective," I said. "Texas Republicans are trying to keep you from voting fraudulently."

She frowned at me. "I thought when you got to be a certain age, they made you go down there," she said. She was looking at my birthdate, 1936, which a little elementary subtraction would yield an age of 77.

I smile graciously and answer, "Fine, thank you. And yourself?" because I know he thinks he is being kind and I don't want to disillusion him.

What I would like to do is tell him and everyone else who calls me "Young Lady" is that condescension is good for neither the young nor the old, but a little real respect goes a long, loooong way.

Gov. Perry Appeals Denial of Presidential Disaster Declaration for Winter Storms

AUSTIN – Gov. Rick Perry today appealed President Barack Obama's denial of a major disaster declaration for 15 Texas counties following severe winter storms December 5-9, 2013. The declaration would have provided federal public assistance for recovery efforts.

"Severe winter weather of this scale and duration is highly unusual in Texas, and has created a strain on both finances and resources for Texas communities," Gov. Perry said. "Families and businesses affected by the storms are in need of significant additional resources beyond local and state capabilities. I urge President Obama to reconsider his denial of assistance to these communities."

On December 5, a destructive ice storm and severe cold front moved into Texas, bringing snow, freezing rain and ice to more than half of the state. In response, the governor issued a state emergency proclamation, which directed additional state resources to prepare for the storm. Continued freezing temperatures led to snow and ice buildup through December 9.

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LET'S REMINISCE: IRISH HERITAGE

With St. Patrick's Day coming up, I want to reminisce about Ireland (also known as Eire) this week. Despite having no Irish ancestry that I'm aware of, I fell in love with Ireland and the Irish people on my first visit with students in 1970. As I made numerous return trips, Irish literature and film became one of my major interests in literary study and teaching. There are several major themes in Irish history and culture.

First is geography and climate. To a Texan Eire seems very small: the greatest distance N-S is 295 miles; E-W is 171. Its coastline has so many zigs and zags that it extends for 2,000 miles. As a small island located within easy sailing distance of several Scandinavian countries as well as England, Spain, and France, it was often invaded. Enough of the invaders stayed behind and intermarried with the native Celts to make a diverse mixture of people. Prehistoric glaciers have given Ireland a beautiful and varied landscape. The weather is temperate all year round (because of warm ocean waters from the Gulf Stream), and the landscape stays green.

The past, or the memory of the dead, is an important cultural and political source for the Irish. In the countryside are many ancient ruins and relics from the past, like the huge stone crosses that dot the countryside (erected in the 10th century by traveling monks). Modern Ireland has drawn heavily on the history and legends of its past in creating a proud heritage for the present. Compared with Americans, the Irish general population nurtures a deeper, stronger sense of history.

Possession or ownership of land is the highest priority of Irish life. Only a day's drive across, Ireland seems too small to contain its epic and clamorous history of struggle for possession. A succession of early invaders—Celts, Vikings, Normans—were followed by 700 years of English domination. Today there are two separate nations: British-controlled Northern Ireland (6 counties) and the Republic of Ireland (26 counties).

Religion, and especially the Roman Catholic Church, is a very important part of Irish culture and society. Today over 90% of the population in the Republic is nominally Catholic. For most of Ireland's history, the Catholic church has been closely identified with the Irish people.

Because the Church of England (Prot.) was the official state church as long as the English dominated, Catholic priests were persecuted, sometimes holding mass out in open fields because they weren't allowed to have a church building or hold public services. Consequently, when the Irish Free State was created in 1922, the Catholic Church established itself strongly and had several of its doctrines written into the constitution. The current movie "Philomena" reflects the dominant role of the church in Irish life during the late 20th century.

Even before the Potato Famine of 1845-50 forced millions to leave Ireland, large numbers of Irish immigrants were coming to the US, and that continued for decades. They brought their love of stories and music, and many wound up in the American South where they contributed greatly to the cultural riches of our region.

Grow a Nutritious Garden in a Pot

Don't let a lack of time or space get in the way of gardening your way to a healthy lifestyle. Plant a container of nutritious vegetables and herbs. Include a few planters on the front porch, back patio or right outside the kitchen door.

All that's needed is some potting mix, fertilizer, plants and a container with drainage holes. A fifteen to twenty-four inch diameter pot or twenty-four to thirty-six inch long window box is a good starting size. Bigger containers hold more plants and moisture longer, so it can be watered less frequently.

Check containers daily and water thoroughly as needed. Self-watering pots need less frequent watering, allowing busy gardeners and travelers the opportunity to grow plants in pots with minimal care.

Fill the container with a well-drained potting mix. Read the label on the container mix bag. Add a slow release organic nitrogen fertilizer, like Milorganite (milorganite.com), at planting for better results with less effort. It provides small amounts of nutrients throughout most of the season and eliminates the need to mix and water in fertilizer throughout the growing season. Sprinkle a bit more on the soil surface midseason or when changing out your plantings.

Mix colorful flowers with nutritious vegetables for attractive, healthy results. Bright Lights Swiss Chard, pansies (their flowers are edible), colorful leaf lettuce, spinach, radishes, and trailing ivy make a great cool season combination. Fresh-from-the-container-garden vegetables make the best tasting salads and the greens provide Vitamins A and C as well as calcium. Use the pansy flowers to dress up a salad or frozen in ice cubes for an added gourmet touch to beverages.

For summer, use a tomato, pepper, eggplant or peas, beans, and cucumbers trained on a trellis. All are packed full of nutrients and make a great vertical accent. Surround the towering vegetables with purple basil, tri-color sage, carrots, beets and a colorful trailing annual like verbena, lantana, or bidens.

Don't forget to squeeze in a few onions or garlic. The fragrant foliage can be decorative and these vegetables help lower blood sugar and cholesterol, while aiding in digestion.

So be creative and add a few small-scale, attractive vegetables high in nutritional value to a variety of containers this season.

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
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Praline Strips
